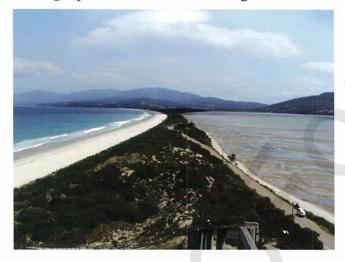

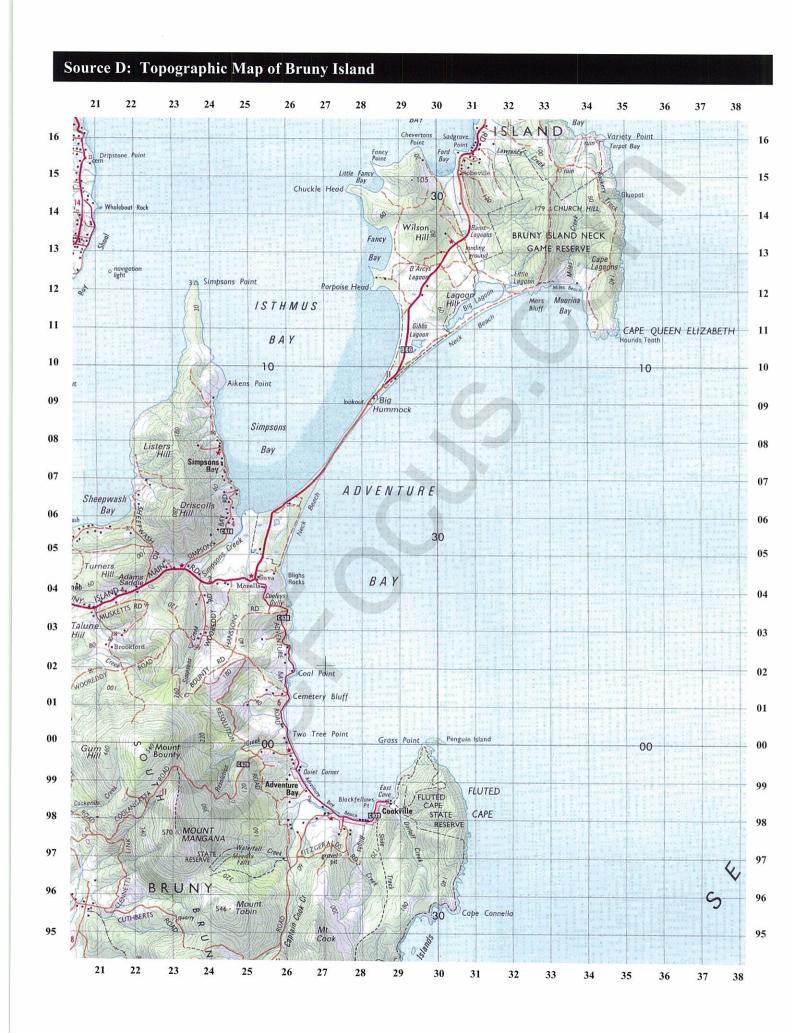

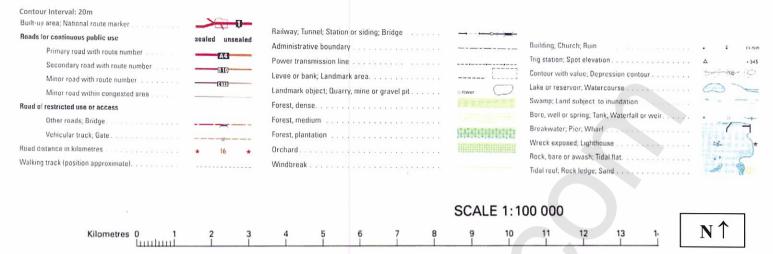


#### Source C: Bruny Island Plant and Animal Life

There is a great diversity of ecosystems on Bruny Island. Much of the island is covered with Wet Eucalypt Forest, Dry Eucalypt Forest and Coastal Heathland. The floral diversity and separation from Mainland Tasmania have resulted in a rich, abundant and diverse range of habitats and associated wildlife. Mammals include echidnas, Bennetts wallabies and brushtail possums. The tiger and copperhead snakes, and several species of skink and frog also inhabit the island. There are 140 species of birds found on Bruny Island. Many birds breed on the beaches including the fairy penguin, short-tailed shearwater and the threatened hooded plover. An area with a great diversity of birdlife can be found at Cape Queen Elizabeth where wattlebirds, honeyeaters, whistlers and wrens are commonly seen. Southern right whales and Humpback whales are often seen around Adventure Bay from June to October during their migration period. The rocky outcrops, found extensively along the coast, are resting places for Australian and New Zealand fur seals. Other marine mammals that frequent the island's waters are pilot whales, leopard seals, southern elephant seals and bottle nosed dolphins.



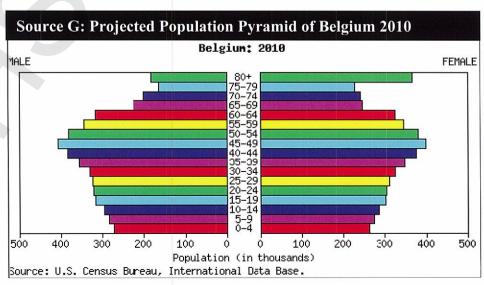
### Legend & Scale to Topographic Map of Bruny Island (Source D)





#### Source F: Background on Brussels

Brussels is the capital city of Belgium. It has grown from a 10<sup>th</sup> century fortress town into a metropolis of over 1.8 million people. It is the largest urban area in Belgium. Since the end of the Second World War, Brussels has become an important focus of economic and political power. It is an administrative centre for many international organisations and corporations. The European Union (EU) and the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) have their main institutions in the city. Brussels is the home to many politicians, diplomats and civil servants, and is ranked third in the world for the number of international conferences it hosts. Nonetheless, the city's traditional spirit survives. It prides itself on handmade lace and chocolate, worships comic strips and serves craft beers in traditional cafes and bistros.

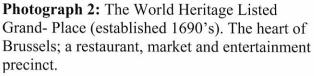
